I am a single mother of one and at the age of 28, I can say I am a 2x Cancer survivor of Hodgkin's Lymphoma. I was first diagnosed June 2012 underwent numerous amounts of chemotherapy where they then pronounced me in remission December 2012. Sadly I was re-diagnose May of 2013. Again I was in the fight for my life and ready for war. More than anything this was a battle of my faith my strength, I was determined and every day I fought I did it with a smile on my face. Knowing that I was a champion I did it once and I could do it again. The second go round was a little more rigorous I underwent a stem cell transplant also known as a bone marrow transplant. Times were hard but I knew I had to fight.





### **Breasts Cancer Tips**

Finding breast cancer early is important so you can get treatment that can save your life. American Cancer Society recommends to help find breast cancer early:

- Have a mammogram every year starting at age 40 and continue for as long as you are in good health.
- Get a breast exam by a doctor or nurse about every 3 years if you are in your 20s and 30s and every year if you are 40 or older.
- Know how your breast look and feel, and tell your doctor or nurse right away. You may wish to start doing breast self-exams (BSE) when you are in your 20s.
- Some women- because of their family history, a genetic tendency, or certain other factors should have an MRI, a special imaging test, in addition to a mammogram. (The number of women who fall into this category is small- less than 2% of all the women in the United States.) Talk with your doctor about your history and if and when you should have MRI.



# Millionare Gang"a synapsis"







# Interview with an Urban Legend

There are whispers in the dark about who is the mastermind behind powerhouses like Akoo and Play Cloths. This person has been elusive, and finally I had the chance to meet the man himself, Ralph Mark Gilbert Reynolds, head of RP55.

Ralph had a humble beginning as an oil painter on the Lower East Side of Manhattan, and one day during the summer of 1983 he awoke with the idea to do tee shirts. That same day he learned the process and went on to make \$850 selling shirts. The rest is urban legend.

"There was a time when there wasn't clothing directed at the hip-hop culture. There was no brand to identify with us," said Ralph, speaking on why he decided to produce clothing. "Luckily I got in the door when the brands like Phat Farm and Fubu were coming out." He has endured many ups and downs dealing with other brands he tried to launch in the past. "I had started a brand called Perpetual Motion. It didn't move an inch." He also tried an afro-centric idea called Soul Food and another brand called R Mark. "R Mark lasted maybe 5 minutes, because I did that one and RP55 at the same time with my original partner, Ron Reynolds who was born in 1955," said Ralph. Hence, we have the creation of Reynolds & Perry 55 (RP55).

RP55 as a clothing brand ran its course throughout the hip-hop and urban culture and died down, but the company itself continued to produce clothing like Azzure and Indigo Red. "If I knew then what I know now about how to make clothes and build a brand, I would've built something really big." Now, Ralph is handling Akoo and Hustle Gang in partnership with T.I. the rapper and Play Cloths with Pusha T the rapper.

Not just limiting the company to clothing, he's ventured into other markets dealing with fashion. "We're the distributor for G-Shock watches (Casio), Zound headphones (Zound Industries), Super Retro Future sunglasses, and a clothing company out of Europe called Blood Brother. Also, we distribute BBC (Billionaire Boys Club)," said Ralph.

His hope for the future of fashion is to one day see a powerhouse brand that is made by us and targeted towards us. "I don't have to do it, but I want to see that one day," said Ralph.

As for wise words for upcoming entrepreneurs, Ralph has a surprise slogan. "I don't know if Nike still uses this, but the key is 'Just do it.'" So, for those who are seeking to became urban legends in their right, "Just Do It."



Javone Johnson:


What do you consider to be the most important aspect of development, with the mind and body?


